The Leader reminded Members of the roles of the Local Plan Task Group and the Planning Committee and highlighted the importance of Members on the Planning Committee attending the training sessions provided.

The Chair thanked the Assistant Director for the report.

CP179 **COUNCIL TAX SUPPORT SCHEME 2021/2022**

In presenting the report, the Revenues and Benefits Manager explained that the council must review and agree its 2021/2022 Council Tax Support (CTS) scheme for working age people by March 2021. The Panel was informed that the council must first consult with the major preceptors then publish a draft CTS scheme for public consultation. The draft CTS Scheme was agreed by delegated decision and the public consultation ran from 17 September 2020 to 2 November 2020. It was highlighted that the final CTS Scheme must then be agreed by full Council.

The Revenues and Benefits Manager highlighted the two changes set out at Section 4 of the report.

Under Standing Order 34, Councillors M de Whalley and C Morley addressed the Panel.

The Revenues and Benefits Manager responded to questions in relation to:

- Level of contribution made by residents.
- Protected groups.
- Self-employed people – assumption made that earnings were at least the minimum wage. Council Tax supported was based on earnings.
- Government Council Tax Hardship Fund – the Council has awarded £400,000.
- Process for recovery of debt.
- Potential for more disadvantage sector of the population to be geographically mapped.

In response to a question from Councillor Morley, the Revenues and Benefits Manager explained that when there was an opportunity to do so a thorough review of the scheme was an option for the Council to consider.

The Chair thanked the Revenues and Benefits Manager for attending and presenting the report.

RESOLVED: The Panel agreed that the draft CTS Scheme for 2021/2022 which went to public consultation is recommended to Cabinet and Council as the final CTS Scheme for 2021/2022.

CP180 **CORPORATE PERFORMANCE MONITORING – INDICATOR SUITE FOR 2020/21**

The Assistant to the Chief Executive presented the report and explained that the Council's performance management framework had historically included performance monitoring and reporting of performance.

Members were reminded that a Covid-19 Recovery Strategy was agreed by Council on 8 October 2020. The report provided an update on the corporate performance monitoring indicators for the Recovery Strategy for the 2020/21 year.

The Assistant to the Chief Executive explained that indicators had been included to monitor key council services and impacts on borough wide issues. These indicators are linked to the Covid-19 Recovery Strategy

and were grouped under the Corporate Business Plan's priorities. It was highlighted that forecasting and target setting were very challenging given uncertainties relating to Covid-19 and its consequences for the community and economy. Comparative data had been included and were available along with an indication of trend.

It was explained that the Council's response to Covid-19 was being ramped up again as infection rates rise and in response to national measures that were announced on 31 October 2020 and will be in place until early December. Resources may therefore be redirected from recovery to focus on response activities and indicators that were heavily influenced the external factors could deteriorate over coming months.

Under Standing Order 34, Councillor C Morley addressed the Panel.

The Assistant to the Chief Executive responded to questions in relation to:

- Budget and financial figures being included as an indicator to monitor on a quarterly basis.
- Priority 3 - Carbon reduction, air quality and biodiversity be added to performance monitoring indicators.
- Usage of electricity.
- Homelessness. The Assistant to the Chief Executive to seek clarification from the Housing Team and respond direct to the Panel.
- Number of rough sleepers.
- Number of referrals to Lily.
- Major Planning Applications. The Assistant to the Chief Executive to seek clarification from the Housing Team and respond direct to the Panel.
- Time of completion for Disabled Facilities Grants. It was noted that regular updates were presented to the Environment and Community Panel.
- Monthly Budget Monitoring report.
- Occupancy and rent arrears of retail units in the control of the Borough Council.

The Assistant to the Chief Executive explained that meaningful indicators which were not too onerous to collect during the recovery would be presented to the Panel, but took on board the comments made by Councillor Morley.

The Chief Executive explained that it had not been possible during the recent months to produce a monthly budget monitoring report, but undertook to discuss with the Assistant Director – Resources and Assistant to the Chief Executive to incorporate 2-3 high level indicators within future performance monitoring reports.

In response to a question from the Chair, the Assistant to the Chief Executive gave reassurance that the Key Performance Indicators on DFG's and ADAPT would continue to be reported to the Environment and Community Panel.

The Chair thanked the Assistant to the Chief Executive for attending and presenting the report.

RESOLVED: The Panel reviewed and noted the Council's performance indicators for the 2020/21 year. Performance against these indicators will be presented to the Corporate Performance Panel via periodic updates.

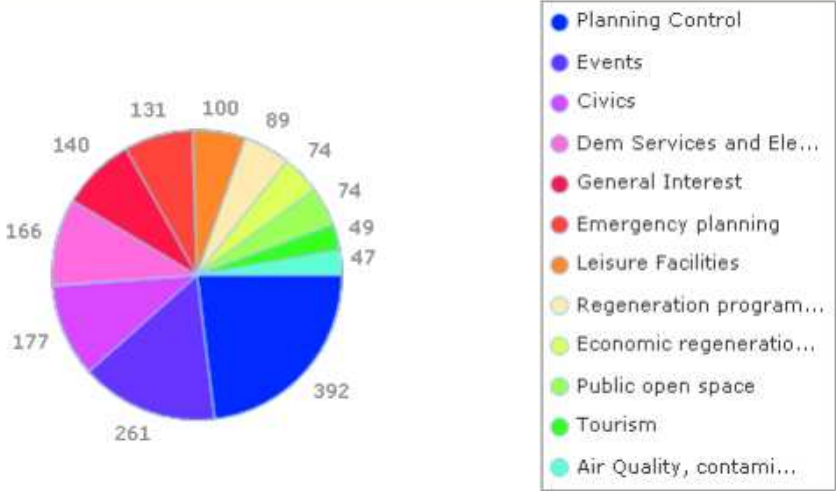
- This activity has resulted in 2085 items of coverage in printed media alone:

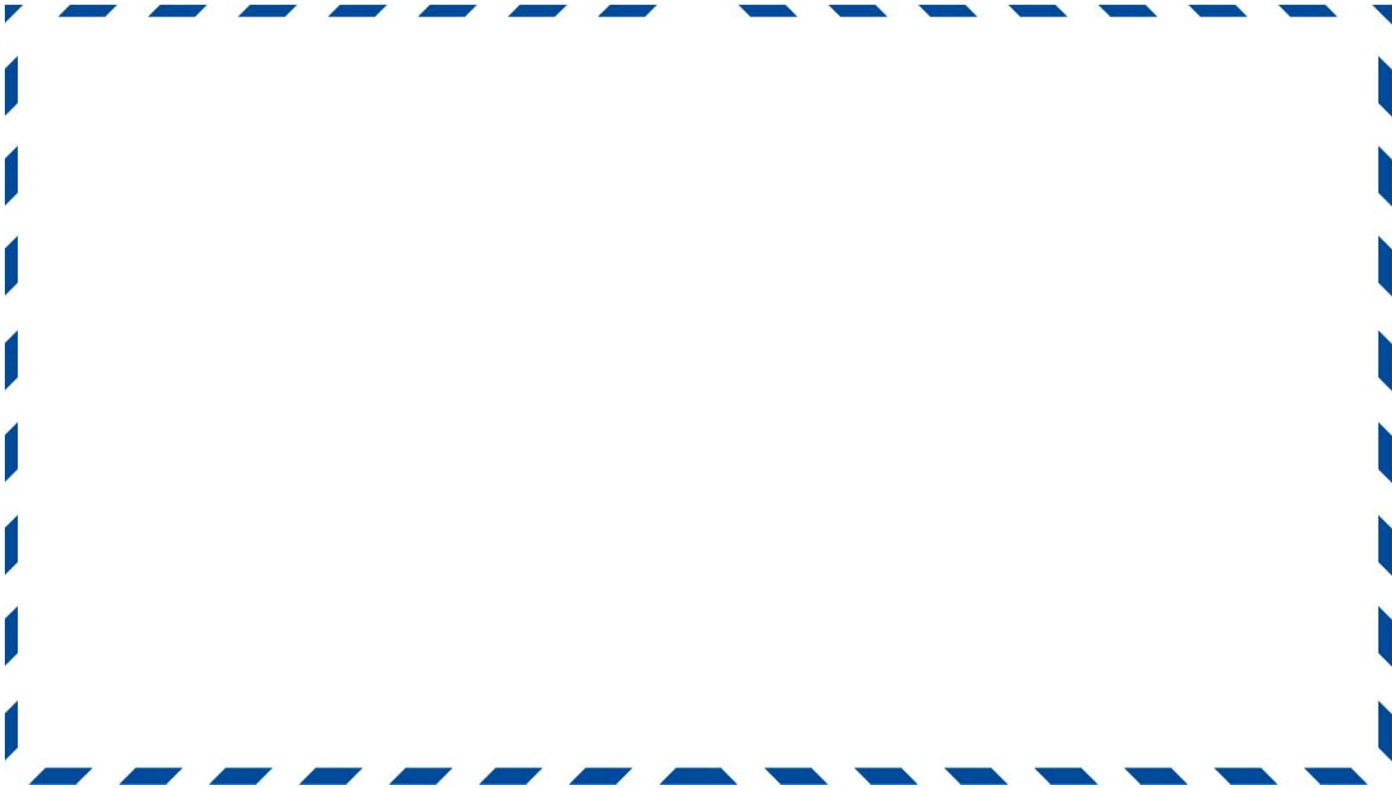

Caring for our West Norfolk communities

Since lockdown on 23 March 2020:

- 40** volunteers supporting our response
- 2,500** extremely vulnerable or vulnerable individuals were identified & personally contacted
- 1,173** Lily referrals for support completed including support for social isolation, loneliness, accessing food, services and wellbeing support
- All rough sleepers have been provided with temporary accommodation since the start of the pandemic
- Throughout April and May, over 1000 free activity club bookings were made for 88 keyworkers' children, supporting 50 families to go to work. All bookings received a free packed lunch.
- Over 1,900** doorstep welfare checks made by volunteers (by week ending 19/6/20). Over 7,000 west Norfolk residents have been contacted by telephone.
- We have donated £10,000** to support King's Lynn Foodbank
- We have delivered over 200** emergency food parcels to residents in need in addition to the Government scheme

Celebrate Virtual VE Day 75 safely at home

Despite the announcement that all the national VE Day celebrations would be deferred until VJ Day in August, plans are under way in West Norfolk to enable people to celebrate the anniversary of Victory in Europe safely in their own homes on 8 May 2020.

A programme of activities has been put together, adjusting those that would have taken place in the Town Hall and around the town centre, so that people can still enjoy them, without leaving their homes.

Stories of Lynn and the Borough Council of King's Lynn & West Norfolk, working with local organisations including Trust's Yard, Festival Too, King's Lynn Festival, Norfolk Museums Service, the Snee and Chance School of Dance, Major Swing and King's Lynn & District R.A.F.A., have come up with a range of activities that enable people to commemorate and celebrate this historic occasion, within the constraints of the current social distancing guidelines.

Activities online include making table decorations from recycled materials, making paper hats, bunting and flags, looking at 1940's recipes, plate spinning with an ARP Warden's chart, taking a 1940's dance class, and of course having a party in your house or garden. The country will raise a toast or glass at 3pm to mark the moment - both then and now during this current crisis.

Trust's Yard have produced a gallery of archive images from the time, and people can tune into Zoom for a talk about Norfolk airfields.

There will be a video of food historian Kathy Hippenon, cooking the winning 1940's recipe so people can cook along, or pick another recipe to produce for their party.

King's Lynn Festival have provided a film clip of Dame Mira Hess who gave many free luncheon concerts in Lincoln's National Gallery during the war to keep up morale. One of the most popular pieces she performed was her own transcription of Beethoven's Joy of music skating.

At 7.15pm the Festival's Ivo Chairwoman Mark Standish will be hosting a 2-hour show so that people can keep the party going, leading up to the national singing of We'll Meet Again, following on from an address by HM The Queen at 8pm.

Throughout the day, the Mayor will be making virtual visits to people's homes and there will be a prize for the best decorated house or garden.

Links to videos, galleries, talks, the disco and activities are all available by visiting storiesoffynn.co.uk/VEDay75 and the Stories of Lynn social media channels @storiesoffynn on Twitter and Facebook. Some links will be added on the day.

The Mayor will invite the winning family for a special tea in the Town Hall when it is safe to do so. Cllr Elizabeth Nookold, Borough Council of King's Lynn & West Norfolk Cabinet Member, said: "As we are thanking our key workers at this present difficult period, it is important for us to remember also our heroes from the past who gave their lives for our country.

"Although we must stay at home and stay safe we can still celebrate this momentous anniversary by taking part in the suggested activities which will help to make it a special day to remember."

"I am delighted that so many community groups and individuals have offered their help with this project, and that the local media KLFM, Lynn News and Your Local Paper and BBC Radio Norfolk have really got behind the project too. The photographs that people share with us will become the archives of the future and it is important, that while we go through these challenging times, we show how we can all still come together."

Ahead of the celebrations, Cllr Geoff Hippenon, the Mayor of the Borough of King's Lynn & West Norfolk, is asking people to invite him to their party. Fill in the online form to request a visit, and he'll join you virtually via Facebook or Whatsapp Video. He is hoping to fit in around 20 visits, those allowing including visiting staff and patients at the QE Hospital at 3pm on Friday, 8 May, when the whole country will be having our heroes post and present.

The idea for this event has come from Richard Williams the Learning and Engagement Officer at Stories of Lynn and Maj Ret'd Gary Walker, Secretary of the King's Lynn & District R.A.F.A., in association with the Mayor of Lynn, the Borough Council of King's Lynn & West Norfolk, Trust's Yard and Norfolk Museums Service.

Maj Ret'd Gary Walker MBE TD VR, Secretary of the local Branch of the Royal Air Forces Association, I was keen that we both commemorate and celebrate the 75th anniversary of VE Day and to make it the Borough's Choice Officers last year to discuss and prepare a plan for the borough for VE Day, which would allow everyone to participate. With the help of Richard Williams, Learning and Engagement Officer at Stories of Lynn, we produced a comprehensive day of events, all of which have now sadly had to be shelved. However, the people

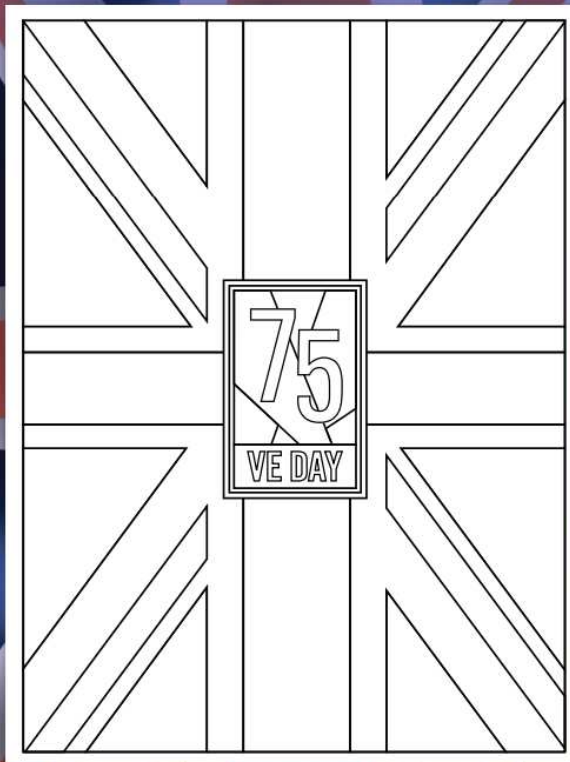

Reflections on VE Day 1945



Dave Taylor (affectionately known as Dot), a volunteer at Stories of Lynn Museum, remembers the events leading up to and including the VE Day celebrations. Here he talks to Rachael Williams, Learning and Engagement Officer at the museum.

So, Dot, you were only young when the war came to the end, what do you remember about the mood at that time?

People suddenly seemed more carefree and happier. There was a different atmosphere and people about the town.

Your parents were key people in your life. Do you recall how they helped you to get used to the end of the war?

My father took me to the Lower Gardens and showed me this strange object which he said was a massive war trophy. He kept saying, 'Look at the size of that huge bomb in the middle! He was frustrated when I couldn't recognise what he was showing me!

I remember the light it gave because earlier in the war my father had taken me into the backyard to show me the scars left by trying to pick up German bombers. It's a very young child, you would have experienced your first street party. What do you remember of that?

I was amongst the children from Waterloo Street who were given a celebration street party. Tablecloths were placed down on alley ways from our street leading to the rear of the houses on St John's Terrace.

The tables were covered in both sheets and I think there was probably jelly and a variety of sandwiches containing fish paste, egg (possibly from devilled egg) and some sort of chocolate spread. I know that it was a special occasion but, as a 5-year-old, did not understand its true significance.

Were the street parties mainly for the children?

Young and old alike enjoyed the street parties. There was also an area a children's dance for grown-ups in the Dolls Hall (community hall) in Welldey Street. I remember wandering along and peeping in the door, listening to the music. It was the first time I had seen a man wearing a hat - one of the Portland street residents was a Scot.

The contrast from wartime to the start of peacetime must have been dramatic.

I was not really aware at the time, thank goodness, but looking back, it's difficult to think that only the month before, concentration camps like Bergen Belsen had been liberated. Thousands of people must have been wandering the countryside trying to find their way back to their much-loved hometowns.

The thought of people coming home must have created a buzz, but what about those who were here in East Anglia throughout the war?

Oh yes, the excitement of the 50,000 American airmen who were stationed in Norfolk with the

possibility of an early return to the USA. They must have changed the atmosphere with anticipation and helped with the VE Day celebrations!

Norfolk had changed a great deal. Between 1942 to 1943, 37 airfields were built in Norfolk. Also, two and half million tons of rubble from the same from the Blitz in London were transported by train to Norfolk to build these airfields.

We are going through a challenging time at the moment across the world. Do you consider there is any similarity between WW2 and the impact of this pandemic?

They are very different circumstances of course, but there is a similarity between the current Coronavirus shutdown and the wartime restrictions.

People are living in fear of their nearest and dearest catching this killer virus just like wartime families were in fear of being bombed or near relatives being killed in action.

Recently, grocery shelves have been temporarily bare. In wartime, even rationed food was scarce and supplies unreliable. Of course, families could look forward to the end of rationing which no-one knew was well-delayed.

There was the constant fear of invasion and many had no knowledge of where their husbands were fighting and whether they would ever return. They did not know when the war would end. The relief at the end of the war cannot be fully understood today.

I understand we had one young evacuee who is now quite famous, delivering in the relative safety of our country borders?

Of the many evacuees brought to Norfolk was a Mansour Maklakh who is better known as Sir Michael Caine. He attended the primary school at North Runcton until 1944 when he passed his '11-plus' examination. He then attended Haverhill Downs in King's Lynn. Because of the bombing of KES Lynn, where he should have been educated, most known took place at the Technical College which was then in Hospital Walk. He spent the academic year 1944-1945 at the Technical College where it is thought he was taught by the local King's Lynn artist, Walter Deakin.

Was Michael Caine ever in King's Lynn during the night?

Every summer since 1940, Hackney Downs School had held their annual sports day on the KES sports field. It was on record that on 2nd May 1943, Maurice Maklakh won the 100 yards in a time of 13.9 seconds. Not bad for a boy from London who arrived in Norfolk with tanks!

NATIONAL RATIONING. TRAVELLER'S RATION BOOK R.B.S.

- How to use this book.**
- The coupon must be written in BLOCK LETTERS in the space provided in the reference leaf (leaf 1).
 - Every time you buy any ration food you must hand your ration book to the retailer and he will detach the appropriate coupon. You must not detach coupons yourself. If you do they will be useless.
 - Coupons are used in the way to which they relate cannot be used later.
- Meat meals.**
- Half a meat or bacon coupon may be used to obtain cooked meat or rationed meat or bacon in a hotel, restaurant, or shop etc. The half coupon must be detached from your book by the person serving the meal.
- Cooked Meat.**
- You may purchase cooked rationed meat as cooked meat shops, but only on a Saturday of a coupon or half coupon. The coupon or half coupon must be detached from your ration book by the person supplying the meat.
- Spare Coupons.**
- Do nothing with the pages it until told what to do.
- Joining the navy, Army or Air Force.**
- If you join the Navy, Army or Air Force or are supplied with rations by the Government or other authority, return this book to the Food Office at once.
- Leaving Great Britain.**
- If you intend to leave Great Britain for more than four weeks, you must hand this book to an Immigration Officer when you embark. If you are being detained for a short period you must retain it but you must show it to the Immigration Officer on leaving and on your return to your year your year.

VJ Day - 15th August 1945

While VE Day in May 1945 marked the end of the war in Europe, many thousands of Armed Forces personnel were still engaged in bitter fighting in the Far East. Fighting in the Asia-Pacific took place from Hawaii to North East India. Victory over Japan Day (VJ Day) marks the day Japan surrendered, on the 15 August 1945.

On that day, US President, Harry Truman announced that the Japanese government had accepted unconditional surrender.

Two days of holiday were declared in the USA, which had borne the brunt of the 'savage' fighting, although this did not diminish the significant contribution played by the forces of Great Britain, Australia, New Zealand, India and China in the fighting in the jungles of Burma and India China.

In the UK that evening, the new British Prime Minister, Clement Attlee, also announced a two-day holiday saying, "The last of our enemies is dead too."

The following evening King George VI once again addressed The Nation and the Empire in a broadcast from his study at Buckingham Palace.

At last, VJ Day was a bit of an anti-climax to VE Day; the war in the Far East had always seemed a long way off and it was no coincidence that the 18th Army, which bore the brunt of the fighting on the Indian border and in Burma, was known as 'The Forgotten Army'.

Unlike VE Day, there were not many Prisoners of War (POWs) returning to be welcomed home, as they were taken prisoner by the Japanese and were still to be freed, having spent many years in virtual slavery, they were in an physical condition to immediately return home. There were no fanfares or parades when they came home in droves and drabs, mostly by train, stopping off at stations in Norfolk, Suffolk and Cambridgeshire.

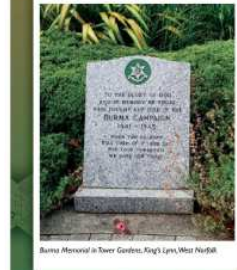
Many of those POWs were from the local area because the 4th, 5th and 6th Battalions of the Norfolk Regiment were sent to Singapore as reinforcements at the start of the war against Japan, only to be taken prisoner by the Japanese shortly after arrival.

Many of those who did return home had serious health problems and were to suffer years of illness before finally succumbing to disease and injury suffered while in captivity.

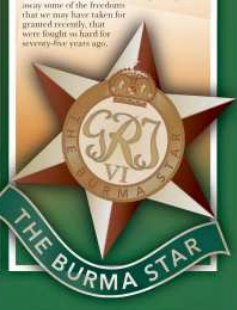
So, the Second World War ended without the explosion that had accompanied the end of the war in Europe. Although people were getting used to being at peace, there was still much to worry about. The General Election had won a shock defeat for Winston Churchill and the Conservative Party, and Clement Attlee, the new Prime Minister, had his hands full in managing a country that was effectively bankrupt.

There was much uncertainty amongst the population about the future and how lives would improve.

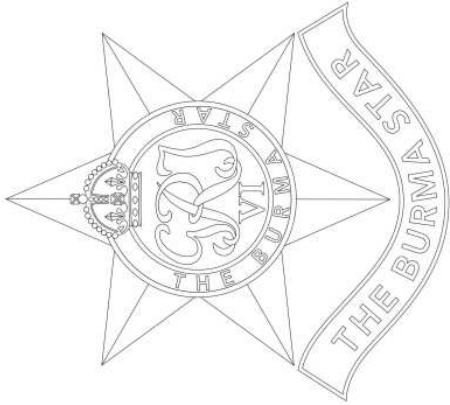
Tomorrow West Norfolk will commemorate the event that marked the end of the Second World War. He not only remembering, but reflecting on more recent events that have temporarily taken away some of the freedoms that we now have taken for granted recently, that were fought to lead for seventy-five years ago.
