This council frequently articulates the desire to improve the town centre, revive the dying shopping precinct and to support local businesses. As such I propose that it invests funds from whichever town centre funding initiative is most appropriate, to rent a large premises for a minimum of 6 months and allowing independent and new retail providers to "test the market" free of rental and associated costs for a period of between 3 to 6 months. There are many industries which have grown and developed during lockdown - cake makers, jewellery, cycle repair and more, who, with the right support, could grow and thrive. Let our council nurture them through their formative months and provide support. This would also have the effect of bringing more people to our stagnant town centre.

This type of support has been provided by smaller towns such as Holt (Love Holt) and could be hugely beneficial to King's Lynn.

There are many councils that have already supported schemes to help bring in new businesses to dying town centres and to increase the footfall. Our council is willing to invest in toilet and shower facilities for the pontoon on the basis that customers using them will spend money in our town, but we currently have very few shops for them to spend their money in. By providing free or heavily subsidised facilities for new businesses to trade in and test the market, we can help revive our town centre and make it the bustling, thriving place it was years ago.

I recently counted over 40 empty shop premises, a number I suspect has only grown and not decreased. By supporting entrepreneurs who have set up online, or who usually use temporary and flexible market stalls, we could revitalise our stagnant and decaying town.
