Bathing Water Quality in West Norfolk

Thank you for your email to Simon Short of 2 May 2023 regarding bathing water quality in West Norfolk.

Bathing water quality remains a local and national priority and we are sorry that you have such grave concerns. As we have said during our recent meetings, bathing water quality is a multi-faceted issue. At the Heacham and the Hunstanton beaches there are, as you know, various factors that may be having an impact on bathing water quality, for instance: drainage misconnections, offline sewage treatment plants, surface water outfalls, dog faeces, sewage discharges as well as natural sources such as birds and seals. As we have discussed, addressing this will need collaborative working between the various stakeholders.

In your letter you mention five other beaches across the country and lessons that might help in West Norfolk. Our officers share lessons learned from other areas through National sector groups and liaison with colleagues. However, each bathing water is in a unique environmental setting with, as outlined above, multiple factors that can affect water quality. While there are some bathing waters where it is clear what factors drive poor or declining bathing water quality there are others with no clear cause. Therefore, each bathing water must be treated individually while using the lessons learned nationally.

The Environment Agency (EA) works within resource constraints, like all publicly funded bodies. The funding we receive from the government for bathing water pays for our statutory responsibilities such as bathing water quality sampling and reporting. In the case of West Norfolk, we have successfully sought extra funding, totalling £38,000, to allow targeted analysis of samples taken during past bathing water seasons and for the upcoming 2023 season.

#### Completed actions:

- Mailshot to beach front properties in Heacham (over 70 properties) providing advice and guidance to property owners to check and maintain small sewage systems at the properties. As we have explained, unless there is a confirmed pollution incident and the pollution has been traced to a specific source, the EA does not have regulatory powers to require property owners to upgrade such systems.
- Liaison between our respective organisations' public relations/press teams (including Anglian Water Services Limited). Bromholme Lane, Brampton, Huntingdonshire, PE28 4NE or Iceni House, Cobham Road, Ipswich, Suffolk, IP3 9JD
- We have engaged the support of the National Laboratory Service (NLS), specifically, Jonathan Porter, a leading expert on the use and application of microbial source tracking to review available data and provide advice on suitable areas for further investigation. In our liaison meetings, it was suggested that the Borough Council may be able to financially support with this aspect. However, after liaising with the NLS, it has

been agreed that this work can be completed within the service agreement between the EA and NLS. We will contact the Council should this situation change.

Ongoing, planned and reactive actions:

- The NLS data review will help determine potential areas for further investigation. Should these require specific funding, we will liaise with the Council and our own internal funding sources. For instance, it is suspected that the sediment in the Heacham river might be acting as a 'bacterial reservoir' which could potentially affect bathing water quality; however, we await the outcome of the NLS review to confirm whether this is a suitable avenue for further investigation.
- Water sampling in Heacham River harbour channel and Searles tributary to provide more up-to-date data (during early part of the bathing season).
- Microbial source tracking (MST) analysis of selected samples during the current bathing season. Samples showing elevated bacterial levels will be subject to MST analysis to aid in developing our understanding of bacterial sources affecting these bathing waters. (To be completed at the end of 2023 season. MST analysis will be dependent on lab capacity).
- Pollution prevention visits are planned to various locations in the catchment, with a focus on the caravan park near Heacham and on other potential sources of bacterial load further upstream (during early part of the bathing season).
- Alongside OfWat, we continue liaising with Anglian Water on bathing water-specific issues and on broader water quality improvements through the Periodic Review (PR), Asset Management Plan (AMP) and Water Industry National Environment Planning (WINEP) process. (Final determination of this work will be made in December 2024, improvements will be implemented between 2025 – 2030)
- Continuing regulation of permitted water discharges in the catchment (both water company and non-water company assets). (Ongoing)
- Agricultural visits The catchment of North West Norfolk has been selected as a priority catchment for agricultural regulatory visits. We will carry out evidence lead targeting of farms and aim to inspect 10 farms within the Heacham catchment before March 2024.
- Pollution incidents reported to us via our Incident Communication Service (0800 807060) will be assessed and responded to in line with our current incident response and categorisation procedures. Any incidents reported to us also add to our understanding of issues affecting the catchment and allow us to make intelligence-led interventions and visits.
- Monthly and ad hoc internal liaison meetings alongside periodic stakeholder meetings.

At our meeting on 13 March 2023, it was mentioned that the Council had data that had been shared with them regarding the longshore drift and sandbank topography/bathygraphy in the area. This information will be useful for our understanding of the issues and we therefore ask that you share it to our Ely Land and Water Team mailbox at <a href="mailto:ely land and water team@environment-agency.gov.uk">ely land and water team@environment-agency.gov.uk</a>, if that is possible. At previous meetings, we highlighted some areas where the local authority can support. This was primarily around ensuring enforcement of litter and dog faeces disposal and ensuring beach front vendors in Hunstanton have appropriate advice about disposing of waste liquids from their operations.

The Environment Agency are not normally consulted on small-scale developments and changes to properties that you're planning or building control teams receive. We therefore propose, if this is feasible for the planning and/or building control departments, that we provide a brief standard paragraph setting out homeowners'/developers' responsibilities to ensure their offline sewage systems are suitably sized and maintained.

Dear Lorraine,

Thank you for your letter of 5 December about the quality of bathing water in Heacham. I apologise for the delay in responding.

Improving water quality is a Government priority, and the Environment Agency (EA) continues to collaborate, drive improvements and look for local solutions to make sure a high standard of bathing water quality is maintained and improved further.

Monitoring data collected by the EA is used to make annual water quality classifications of Excellent, Good, Sufficient or Poor. If the water quality at a bathing water does not meet the standards set by the Regulations, the EA will investigate the sources of pollution to identify remedial measures that can be put in place. There are numerous factors that can impact on bathing water quality, including pollution from water and sewerage company assets and diffuse pollution caused by run-off from agricultural and urban areas.

The wastewater treatment works at Heacham has bacterial control with ultraviolet treatment of the effluent which significantly reduces the level of live bacteria. Officers from the EA make regulatory visits to this and other Anglian Water Services Ltd (AWS) assets across the area. The most recent to Heacham was in April 2022 and no compliance issues were found.

The EA has investigated other potential causes of the poor bathing water quality in the area. It visited caravan parks in the vicinity to investigate the potential for misconnections of foul drainage into surface drainage systems and found no significant issues. The EA also investigated the local Sea Life centre, which has its own discharge to the beach in Hunstanton and ultraviolet treatment. Again, it found no compliance issues during the visit.

In addition to statutory bathing water samples, the EA has collected and analysed samples from the Heacham River and other sites in the area. Where elevated levels of bacteria were found, selected samples from this year and recent years were subjected to specialised analysis to try to identify the potential sources of bacteria (for example whether from human, ruminants, dogs or bird sources). The data indicates that there is a constant bird-related influence with human and dog-related bacterial sources being more variable.

Grant in Aid funding for bathing water-related work by the EA is primarily allocated for the collection of bathing water quality samples and provision of pollution risk forecasts. However, due to the significance of bathing water quality issues in East Anglia, the EA's local area team made successful bids for extra funding to allow for additional sample analysis for the 2022 and 2023 bathing water seasons. This will help to gain a better understanding of the potential factors affecting bathing water quality.



The local EA team with responsibility for bathing waters recently had a constructive and positive meeting with the Borough Council of King's Lynn & West Norfolk and AWS. All parties at the meeting committed to continuing this constructive and partnership approach to understanding and improving the situation.

In the coming bathing water season, the EA will continue to regulate AWS and private discharges in the area. It will also continue its investigations into potential factors affecting bathing water quality with a focus on working with other stakeholders to maximize the effectiveness of the investigations.

Thank you once again for taking the time to contact me about this important issue.






### **Reasons for Current Status**



- Compliance sites sampled half hourly for 60 bathing days i.e. 60 x 25=1,500 samples all analysed in triplicate = 4500 enumerations per bathing water. With multiple dilutions this increases to 9000 enumerations.

#### WITHIN-DAY VARIABILITY (SWANSEA BAY DSP)





- Within-day variability can be high and varies between days: e.g. a maximum of 10<sup>3.08</sup>/100ml at the Swansea Bay DSP with 10<sup>3.88</sup> at Nolton DSP and mean daily range approached 10<sup>2</sup> at most sites but is lower at Swansea Bay DSP
- The pattern has proven highly diurnal at one site

#### **Bathing Water Quality in West Norfolk**

We are writing to express our concern regarding the water quality issues that the borough council is experiencing in Heacham. The lack of support from the Environment Agency is very disturbing despite the problem being unresolved for several years and Heacham being one of only five in the UK experiencing such poor water quality.

The uniqueness of Heacham and the tourism it brings to west Norfolk cannot be underrated, together with an active shellfish industry that is dependent on the ability to harvest from unpolluted waters.

We have been working with Anglian Water who have been helpful in investigating and identifying potential causes of poor water quality, however, they are only able to undertake this on the infrastructure that they have responsibility for, which still leaves other routes as potential sources. As yet, we do not appear to be able to gain any momentum with the Environment Agency providing the resources necessary and implementing a plan of action to identify the problem, let alone address it.

The 2022 bathing water quality classification published today confirms that Heacham will remain classified as 'poor' for a 2<sup>nd</sup> successive year, these results are based on samples taken during the preceding 4 years. In addition, the shellfish waters for this area have also seen poor results, resulting in a closure of the shellfish harvesting area earlier this year. In addition to the poor classification for Heacham, more worryingly the classification for Hunstanton (Old) has reduced in the 2022 classifications from 'good' to 'sufficient', which is showing a worrying trend not just related to the Heacham locality.

As a result, the borough council is actively seeking a resource to provide specialist help. Although it is not within the borough council's remit to seek such resources, it has become necessary for us to move ahead with addressing the problem ourselves to avoid losing any further valuable and much needed tourism to the area. We would therefore very much appreciate your assistance with escalating the required work by petitioning the Environment Agency to urgently work with us.

We would be happy to discuss this matter further with you.



## BATHING WATER POLLUTION





#### Dog Poo

Dog poo contains some nasty parasites and bectera and any fouling on the beach that's not picked up gets washed into the sea.



#### Sower Capacity

Sudden increases in seasonal holiday makers can put extra pressure on sever capacity. Couple this with a reduction in sewer capacity due to a build up of fats, oils and grease and sewers and Water Recycling. Centres can struggle to copts, making a pollution incident more likely.



#### Highways

Pollution can come from highways drainage. Run off from roads during wot weather washes chemicals, traces of oil, dirt and other pollutants into the bea.



#### Grazing Animals

Excrement from grazing animals can wash off fields into bathing waters during periods of heavy rainfall



#### Private Overflows

Discharges from private sewer systems, such as private purposes stations owned by caravan parks or privately owned cess pits, could result in untreated sewage entering the bathing water.



#### **Bird Droppings**

Bird droppings contain harmful bacteria and can wash down from rooftops when it rains into the bathing water Droppings from large populations of birds under piers and other coastal structures can also be a problem

#### Chemicals and Fertilisers

Chemicals and fertilisers wash into rivers from farmland when it rains.



#### **Muck Spreading**

Muck spreading or the presence of manure heaps can result in bacteria washing into the bathing water when it rains.



#### Overflows

To protect properties from flooding during heavy rainfall combined sewer overflows and emergency overflows can lead to dilute sewage entering the bathing water.



#### Litter encourages vermin which carry disease. Their excrement gets washed into the bathing water along with the litter.

#### Equipment Checks

Routine visits to Water Recycling Centres and Pumping Stations are essential in discovering and preventing asses which could otherwise affect bathing water quality



#### Boats


Boats can flush their bilge tanks and discharge onboard toilets directly into the sea.



#### Seaweed and Sediment

Bacteria growing in seawbed can pollute bathing water. Disturbed sand and sediment on the sea bed can release trapped bacteria.

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





# Intertek Source Apportionment Study







#### Dear Secretaries of State

Norfolk's planning authorities were one of many authorities affected by the Natural England letter of 16<sup>th</sup> March concerning nutrient neutrality in our waterways. In our case most of Norfolk, including the entirety of the major urban area of Norwich lies within the catchment area for either the River Wensum SAC or the Broads SAC.

Water quality is recognised as an important issue for us all. Norwich City Council have recently worked with local partners to bring forward a River Wensum Strategy which aims to improve both recreational access to the River Wensum but also its biological health. The council is also looking at ways it can improve the biodiversity offer of the River Wensum. Clearly preserving and enhancing the delicate and unique eco-systems of the Broads are also of considerable strategic importance to the long-term quality of life that Norwich, and Norfolk will be able to deliver to its residents.

We have acted quickly to try to address the arising implications, working together across Norfolk: we have tendered for consultants to support the delivery of a Norfolk wide Nutrient Mitigation Strategy. We anticipate this work will be completed in Winter 2022 and one of the outcomes will be to identify appropriate solutions.

Whilst we remain hopeful that a strategic solution(s) will be identified, it is becoming increasingly clear that the land take required, associated costs and timescales for delivery, will be significant. In the absence of a strategic solution, applicants are still having to seek their own nature based or alternative solutions to demonstrate their proposals are nutrient neutral.

The jointly prepared Greater Norwich Local Plan¹ was submitted for examination in public in July 2021. The plan seeks growth to 2038 and is ambitious in its vision identifying more than sufficient housing growth to meet needs and to deliver significant economic development. The examination sessions have taken place and we were on course to adopt the plan in early 2023 recognising the importance of the plan-led system and the Government's drive to have NPPF compliant local plans in place by the end of 2023.

The advice from Natural England has resulted in significant uncertainty for the progress of the plan and the Inspectors have recently asked how nutrient neutrality will be addressed: <u>GNLP WMS Letter April 2022</u> 0.pdf.

As you will be aware, housing delivery is a crucial test of soundness for the plan and the area affected covers the vast majority of the plan's strategic growth area. The resulting ambiguity about housing delivery following the NE advice means that the trajectory and deliverability of the housing growth is fundamentally thrown into question.

Other Norfolk authorities are looking to submit their local plans to the Inspectorate and the Natural England advice has disrupted their progress significantly, also leaving them uncertain as to when they might secure adoption and thereafter delivery of much needed growth.

The advice from Natural England has thrown into question the delivery of tens of thousands of homes across the region, including affordable homes for which there is significant need in the region.

There is a substantial short-term risk because of the NE guidance that development will be redirected to areas significantly further from Norwich City, the largest driver for growth in the area and the focus of substantial investment in infrastructure to support that growth agenda. This would create less sustainable travel patterns at a time when net-zero is a high priority and put unacceptable pressure on infrastructure in locations where plans are not in place to support large-scale growth and even have a further detrimental and irreversible impact on other protected landscapes.

The Norfolk authorities are of the view that the actions of Natural England here are disproportionate and unnecessarily damaging to our collective growth agenda. We remain disappointed to learn that the announcements were made in response to monitoring data, some of which was produced in 2019. Yet in the intervening 2 years plus Natural England have been focussed on developing national tool kits and appear to have deliberately foregone any opportunity to alert or engage with affected local authorities, thereby denying us the opportunity to develop the locally required solutions.

Had we known earlier what the data was showing – at a time when the coronavirus pandemic had for obvious reasons led to a downturn in planning applications – we could have developed a response by now. As things stand, this intervention from Natural England could not have come at a worse time for – at the very moment Covid restrictions are eased and our focus is on growing the economy, the Norfolk authorities are not able to approve planning decisions.

Council officers are working at pace to resolve this situation and have met with Natural England. We have been left shocked that Natural England couldn't describe the harm resulting from the nutrient levels or whether they were on an improving or declining trend. They could confirm that the waterways fell within certain percentage thresholds of favourable biological condition through pollutants but were unable to describe what harm was arising to native species as a result.

We consider the action of Natural England to have been undertaken without due consideration for the impacts, and through the failure to engage with the local authorities for 2 years may actually have been harmful to the quality of the waterways that ourselves and Natural England are seeking to protect.

We are collectively considering our legal response to this matter. Whilst we do this, we request that you support our desire to move quickly and put pressure on Natural England to take a pragmatic approach. Our ideal outcome would be rapid action from your departments to support the local authorities with continuing to deliver the growth this country needs by:

- instructing Natural England to formally withdraw the letter of 16<sup>th</sup> March and replace with one giving a minimum of one year's notice before the requirement to comply is introduced.















If you are unable to support this course of action, we ask that you

- Enable local plan inspectors to take a pragmatic approach to the Greater Norwich Local Plan, which has significantly progressed through in the examination process, and any others submitted by the Norfolk authorities. The plan(s) should be allowed to be adopted without a 5YLS and incorporate a stepped housing trajectory reflecting deliverability now impacted by nutrient neutrality advice
- Require Natural England to engage positively with discussions to investigate how special dispensation can be given to key regeneration proposals to allow consents to be issued prior to details of mitigation being confirmed (for instance through agreeing conditions requiring mitigation measures yet to be identified)
- Additionally, should the current advice remain in place, the operation of 5year land supply calculations and Housing Delivery Tests should be suspended to avoid areas draining to different catchments being subject to speculative, unreasonable, and unsustainable development pressures.

Norfolk is a pro-development area with ambitious plans for growth and regeneration. We are at this very moment negotiating an ambitious devolution deal with Government to help deliver the Levelling Up agenda. However, we have been stopped in our tracks by disproportionate and counter-productive action by Natural England which has taken us by surprise. It is our residents, business, communities; the people of Norwich and Norfolk, will suffer as a result.

We trust that you recognise the progress the Norfolk authorities have made to date. Evidently the existing national water quality issues will remain a barrier on housing delivery for several years which requires urgent attention if we and other affected authority areas are going to be able to help address the national housing crisis.

We urge you to positively consider our proposals as set out in this letter which would facilitate the continuation of the adoption of the GNLP and other local plans and enable significant regeneration and housing growth to go ahead. We would welcome the opportunity to discuss the content of this letter or provide additional information should you find it helpful.

- Survey solutions procured to undertake surveys of existing at a cost of £2,800.
  The package of work will result in a co-ordinated set of drawings giving sufficient
  detail of the existing structure and services so that a design brief can be
  procured. Timing and duration of the surveys has been arranged to minimise
  disruption to service users.
  - Building and topographical surveys taking place Weds 14th July
  - Utilities and CCTV drainage surveys taking place Weds 21st July

#### The Design Brief will include 2 options:

- Refurbish existing building reusing existing services
- Demolish and replace building reusing existing services

The design brief will depend on the outcome of the surveys, especially the Utilities and CCTV drainage survey. A key issue will be the capacity of the existing drainage.

In terms of operational matters, we have attended to some of the minor maintenance items such as the replacement of fittings and some lighting as well as deep cleaning the whole area.

#### Caravan

Stuart is in touch with the owner of the land where the caravan is now sited. The
owner has received a note in writing from the BC which he has shown to the
owner of the caravan, who has stated that he is waiting for the caravan to be
repaired so it can be moved from the third party land. If it is moved back on site,
Stuart will enact the notice and direct action.

#### Food Outlet at South Beach

• Stuart has spoken to Cllr Parish regarding this outlet. Stuart believes it hasn't been operating but a notice has been drafted to go out.

#### Illegal Campsite at South Beach

• A notice has been served under Health & Safety legislation following a visit from the HSE. The owner has submitted another planning application which has been sent back under S 700C, that is the BC are refusing to determine it due to the previous enforcement notice. The only recourse is to judicially review that decision. The prosecution file is still with Eastlaw. This same owner has also received injunctions along the coast preventing camping on two other sites.

#### **Bushell & Strike**

Stuart has been speaking to the owner and is told that it has been taken off the
website advertising this for the time being. Seems it is not being used at the
moment, but it is understood they may be seeking to apply for an exemption for
a 5 site to allow it to be used in future.

#### Former Kingdom Hall

• Stuart is dealing with multiple complaints about the grant of planning permission and listed building consent again (it has been approved twice already in the past) to convert the building to residential. Stuart hopes to respond before his leave next week.
